




Andrew McMillen is a Brisbane-based award-winning freelance journalist and author. His work has been published in Rolling Stone, The Australian, The Monthly, Qweekend and BuzzFeed. In 2015, he was named Freelance Journalist of the Year at the Queensland Clarion Awards. Andrew's first book, *Talking Smack: Honest Conversations About Drugs*, was published by UQP in 2014. Bec Mac is a provocative, performance-based artist and commentator whose work straddles performing arts, visual arts, broadcast media and photography. Bec produced and presented her legendary live art event LOVE TV over the last 10 years having presented it throughout Australia and New York's City's 5 Boroughs. Bec is the presenter of Friday Neon on 4ZZZ, has produced and hosted 2 seasons of her TV series The Rec Mac Show and MCs festivals and events.

Ben McLeay is a Brisbane-based writer and musician known primarily for tweeting as Thomas Violence and writing for SBS Comedy's The Backburner, also to a much lesser extent for being really incredibly good at Railroad Tycoon 3. He plays keys in Brisbane band The Keepaways and will until he earns experience enough points to move up to a cooler instrument. @thomas_violence

Bernard Zuel has been writing about music since typewriters, C90 mixtapes and coming home stinking of everyone else's smokes. He's written for RAM, Rolling Stone and street press, and talked on TV and radio for anyone who asked. He's been covering arts at the Sydney Morning Herald/Fairfax Media for more than 20 years, the past 12 or so as senior music writer and chief critic. He still buys records and discs and sound files because it's great. @BernardZuel

Bob Weatherall is a traditional owner of the Kamilaroi Nation from the Balonne River region in South West Queensland. For almost 40 years, he has been an advocate for Aboriginal rights, land rights and Aboriginal self- governance. In the 1980s, he and other Aboriginal and Islander leaders campaigned successfully and forced the Queensland government to revoke Queensland's apartheid laws (The Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders Acts) which governed the lives of Aboriginals and Torres Strait Islanders since 1895. He continues to fight governments, museums, universities, medical schools and art galleries across the world for the rights of the dead and repatriation of the thousands of stolen Aboriginal ancestral human remains and Aboriginal cultural property.

Chris Endrey is an involved artist of various worlds, hoping to engage people in their lives and society. The frontman for cult sex-pop band Fun Machine writes on politics and culture and has been touring his one-man stand-up comedy show to sold out crowds across the continent.

Chris Salewicz documents popular culture in print, on film, television and radio. A senior features writer for NME from 1975 to 1981, Salewicz subsequently worked for The Sunday Times, the Independent, the Daily Telegraph, Q, MOJO, and Conde Nast Traveller, and newspapers and magazines across the globe. Chris is the author of seventeen books, including Rude Boy: Once Upon a Time in Jamaica; Redemption Song: the Definitive Biography of Joe Strummer, and Bob Marley: the Untold Story. His most recent book is Dead Gods: The 27 Club, an analysis of the deaths of seven 27-year-old musical maestros including Amy Winehouse, Kurt Cobain, and JimiHendrix, published in July 2015.





































Clinton Walker is a Sydney-based writer and producer described by the Sun-Herald as "our best chronicler of Australian grass-roots culture". Born in Bendigo in 1957, he is an art school drop-out and recovering rock critic who since the late '70s has written 9 books. His greatest hits include Inner City Sound, Highway to Hell, Buried Country, Studio 22, Golden Miles, History is Made at Night and Silver Roads. He is currently working on Deadly Woman Blues — about the great black ladies of Australian music, on a cultural history of Saturday Night Fever called Blood and Money, and on a stage musical called God's Whore. clintonwalker.com.au

He is also The Saturday Paper's music critic, where his insightful, intelligent reviews have placed him at the vanguard of Australian rock writers.

Dr David Megarrity is a writer, composer, musician, academic and player creating at the intersection of music, performance and projected image. Completely focussed on the creation of new work, often musicalising theatre and theatricalising music, he has a long and colourful track record of innovating across artforms while continuing to entertain. Currently playing with Warmwaters and Tyrone and Lesley.

Deborah Conway has been a contributor to Australian music for over 30 years. Her first band Do Re Mi topped the charts; her first solo album achieved platinum sales and she continues to release albums that attract critical acclaim and appreciative audiences. Alongside being a musician, Conway's side projects include producing Broad, an all-female singer/songwriter concert that toured between 2005 & 2008; Artistic Director for the Queensland Music Festival 2009 - 2011 & currently, Festival Director for Shir Madness Melbourne Jewish Music Festival.

Don Walker has few peers in illuminating the darker underbelly of the Australian psyche, whether he's performing with Cold Chisel, Tex, Don and Charlie or solo. Angry women, luck-chasers, heartbroken prodigals who don't smell good and anyone who just wants to throw the afternoon away on a game of pool—they're all still there. Shots, his extraordinary memoir had The Age stating that "Shots rings out like a whip crack across a landscape of rural Australia, lonely highways and endless gigs".

Geoff Corbett has fronted seminal Brisbane rock and roll band SixFtHick for more than 20 years and has lived to remember some of it. SixFtHick has toured nationally and internationally forging a reputation as one of Australia's most dangerous live acts. Geoff also fronts alco-core dive bar denizens Shifting Sands. Paradoxically, it would seem, Geoff has worked for the past decade in frontline AOD treatment, across inpatient detox, emergency department, dual diagnosis and outreach settings. With a foot in both camps he is torn between two lovers.

J.M. Donellan is a teacher, slam poet, DJ, musician, collaborator and writer. Josh is also one half of the spoken word/electronic band Poetry is Dead. He has almost been devoured by a tiger in the jungles of Malaysia, nearly died of a lung collapse in the Nepalese Himalayas, fended off a pack of rabid dogs with a guitar in the mountains of India and been sexually harassed by a half-naked man while visiting Oscar Wilde's grave in Paris. His latest novel, Killing Adonis is described as "the book that Agatha Christie and Tim Burton would have written together if they'd ever met.. the perfect blend of mystery and the mysterious."







Jake Stone is best known as the extroverted frontman for beloved Australian band Bluejuice, but is also a writer and presenter for television, radio and print media. Jake has written for The Sydney Morning Herald's News Review section, and recently contributed a lead feature to the Guardian's arts section. He also contributes to Hhhhappy.com and Junkee.com, and works as a freelance host for online and television music broadcasting, often with a satirical bent.



Jenny Valentish is the author of Cherry Bomb, a psychodrama set in the Australian music industry. She is the former editor of Time Out (Melbourne) and Triple J's Jmag, and writes profiles for The Sydney Morning Herald and The Saturday Paper. Jess Ribeiro's second album Kill It Yourself came after a three-year hiatus, in which she travelled the world and submitted herself to the kind of soul searching that only a restless artist is capable of. She credits its producer - and her collaborator - Mick Harvey (PJ Harvey, Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds) as the catalyst for rediscovering her muse. Beguiling and poetic reflections of youth, love and life find solace in Harvey's subtle production; sympathetic strings, languid tempos and gothic blues swagger. It shrewdly balances darker, haunting themes with rays of optimism, nostalgia, wit and beauty.



John Busby is a key songwriter in Brisbane rock band Halfway. Over the past decade they've released four albums, and in 2008 Busby was awarded the Grant McLennan Memorial Fellowship along with co-writer Chris Dale. Halfway's fifth studio album, recorded in Nashville, is due for release in 2016. halfway.com.au



Kate Hennessy's music and arts criticism runs in The Guardian, ABC Arts, SMH, The Quietus, Australian Book Review and Mess+Noise. Kate appears on ABC TV and has spoken at Vivid Ideas, Darwin Writers' Festival and BigSound. Travel journalism has taken Kate to Africa, Papua New Guinea, Turkey, Solomon Islands and Peru. He has appeared in many stand up comedy venues and at the Sydney Comedy Festival.

Ritchie Yorke is one of Australia's most revered writers, an author of numerous music books including acclaimed biographies on Led Zeppelin and Van Morrison. Leaving Australia in 1966, he became the first full-time rock writer at Canada's national paper, The Globe and Mail, and went on to become one of the most widely syndicated rock writers in the world. He was also Canadian editor of Billboard magazine and Rolling Stone for several years, and has interviewed (and often became friends with) many of the biggest names in rock music. Ritchie returned to Brisbane in 1986 as Senior Music Writer for The Sunday Mail. His latest book, *Christ You Know It Ain't Easy: John and Yoko's Battle for Peace*, is an account of his involvement with John and Yoko Lennon on their peace campaign.



Sally Breen is the author of *The Casuals* (2011) and *Atomic City* (2013), shortlisted for the Queensland Literary Awards People's Choice Award in 2014. *The Casuals*, a memoir, focuses on the grunge era in the 1990s and won the Varuna Harper Collins Manuscript Prize. Her short-form fiction and non-fiction work has been featured widely both nationally and internationally including appearances in the Griffith REVIEW, The Asia Literary Review, Overland, The Age, The Australian, Review of Australian Fiction and Best Australian Stories. Sally is a senior lecturer in Creative Writing at Griffith University.



Samuel J. Fell is a freelance writer and author. He is assistant editor at Rhythms magazine and is a regular critic and feature writer for The Sydney Morning Herald, Rolling Stone and The Big Issue. His music writing has also appeared in The Saturday Paper, Crikey, the Australian Financial Review, Cleo, Tracks and Australian Guitar amongst others. Concurrently, Samuel is writing his first novel, and a history on 50 years of Australian music press, which will hopefully see the light of day in 2016.



Samuel Wagan Watson is an award winning poet published by University of Queensland Press. "I take all of my writing influences from pop culture.
